At Branch level he is also managing the record keeping for all our H&S and training documents, keeps our branch inventory up to date and is maintaining the servicing documents until a specific servicing sheet is created for a piece of kit. Swindon Branch

MCC volunteers continue to assist Swindon Branch, with Fiona Rivers helping Swindon Work Party Organiser (WPO) Henry Sullivan to get a load of their kit back to Swindon. This has the added benefit of clearing one of our small containers. Some more kit is to go back, which I will probably take to the Peterborough Arms so that it can be collected from there.

Fundraising

I made a bid to Chippenham Area Board for a grant to go towards a bank mower for the Bee Route tractor that Howard Yardy had suggested would be useful to save volunteers hours of brushcutter work. This unit would cut the grass on the canal banks and allow the grass to be cut around the base of trees. The Area Board agreed a grant of £1,175 and with money already available, we have been able to order this mower. This kit of course is used anywhere along the canal line within driving distance of the tractor, currently juts Royal Wootton Bassett. Our fundraisers are looking for a trailer, which will get the Bee Route tractor to all areas along the line of the canal ... subject to a willing volunteer with a vehicle powerful enough to tow it ©

Through personal contacts, Gordon Olson has made the Trust aware of planning proposals for 2,525 houses in the Pewsham area of Chippenham, which could benefit the Trust in the form of S106 funding. Under S106 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990, as amended, contributions can be sought from developers towards the costs of providing community and social infrastructure. We have benefitted from this in Melksham for the Melksham Link Project with David Wilson Homes donating £75,000 of S106 money. The proposal at Pewsham is in the early stages but representations will be made as soon as the process allows.

Projects

Looking forward to 2024/25, a Project planning meeting involving MCC WPOs and advisors is planned for mid April. The Project Funding Matrix submitted to HQ in 2023 will also be reviewed.

River Avon in Chippenham

I have been attending meetings concerning the Chippenham River Project which is dealing with the refurbishment of areas at the side of the River Avon in Chippenham. We are joining with partner organisations to lobby the Environment Agency (EA) for a like for like solution when they replace the radial gate in the River Avon in Chippenham. This gate is being removed and, unless a similar alternative is provided, the water level in the river will drop considerably.

The EA favour "re-wilding" the river in Chippenham, which will effectively lower the water level and the speed of the river, so it might end up a simple stream and not the lovely wide and useful waterway it currently is. The EA & Town Council are holding public consultations on the dates listed below and, if you live in Chippenham or surrounding areas, I would urge you to visit one of these and make comment as and where you see fit.

New Director

Thuan Bui will be joining us as our interim branding director.

Thuan's main responsibilities will be:

- Branding: most of this has already been done by previous branding director;
- **Targeting**: defining the persons that we are targeting for our marketing (volunteers, members, corporates, government);
- Messaging: making sure that our messaging fits those different groups; and
- **Training**: to ensure our comms reach the target.

National Forest

Wiltshire Council are putting in an application for a second National Forest. There is already one up north, which was established 30 years ago. There is a new competition to set up a second one, and the prize money is about £9-10 million.

The plan is to link up about 500 square miles of old royal hunting forest from around Wells in the South to around Melksham. Part of the canal route would be in the North of the area. It is not a land grab, but a way to increase tree coverage. Mike Gibben, Trust CEO, has written a letter of support for the plan.

In a few months' time we will see if they have reached the short list of about four counties, and can go through to the second round. The bidding process is run by DEFRA.

Wiltshire Council

Following some changes at Wiltshire Council, Cllr. Sven Hocking has been appointed as the portfolio holder for Arts Heritage & Tourism, which includes canals. We welcome Cllr. Hocking as the new Chair of the Wiltshire Swindon & Oxfordshire Canal Partnership and thank Cllr. Najjar for his work on the project for the past three years.

Work Parties



Pewsham Locks


Restoration

Well the rains continued throughout the month but we still managed to carry out plenty of work.

Most work was centred on our three main projects: The Carpenters Workshop, The Dry Dock and Top Lock Bridge, which all have their separate reports.

As well as the work on these projects the following has been achieved:

- a safe working area was created for the brick cutter. This has now been put in place and is being used to cut bricks for the Top Lock work;
- good to see Brian Grinham back on site and cleaning bricks;
- the Welfare Unit roof was painted, which will hopefully stop the water leaks;
- the water harvesting tray/framework was retrieved and made ready to be put up on the roof of the Welfare Unit (hoping to collect some water!);
- a stand was made up for having a water butt put on it, ready for storage of the harvested water; this will also feed water into the large water tanks within the Welfare Unit; fingers crossed, we will have running water to the sinks for hand washing;
- a grass pathway was cut around the top of the Lower Pound and the working area around the Dry Dock;
- a pathway running behind the Carpenters Workshop down to the Lower Pound was cleared of debris;
- the grass around The Wharf area was strimmed ready for the Boat Trips on the first of the Pewsham Days on Saturday 13 April;
- dredging took place where Hannah's Brook enters the canal; this resulted in the removal of a large amount of silt, and hopefully will allow for the passage of our work boat *Boswell* and trip boat *The Mary Archard*;
- Pewsham (aka the Butty) was taken up to Hannah's Brook ready for the Work Party Organisers' site visit to discuss ways to limit the silt entering the canal;
- Work Party Organiser Fiona Rivers carried out a Health & Safety audit with our H&S Adviser Andrew Fergusson, who was happy with our safe working culture; and
- Fiona also gave a H&S induction to a new volunteer and Toolbox Talks on First Aid Kits & use of the Defibrillator and on RAMS (Risk Assessments and Method Statements) to other volunteers.



We've also been busy on maintaining our Plant & Equipment:

- the battery was replaced on one of our dumpers (battery kindly supplied by Martin Palmer);
- the drive belt tensioner was adjusted on the 26" All Terrain Mower;
- the inside walls of Pop-up Café were painted;
- a sump hole was dug, using the large excavator, for cement mixer wash out;
- a new fuel filter was fitted to the Jacobsen Truck, aka the buggy (it's running much better now);
- a battery isolation switch was fitted to the large excavator; and
- we started preparing the wooden sides of our "second" road trailer ready for painting.

Water ingress

The trial wall of blocks is working really well and the volume of water in the pub porch is slight. As a result of this wall there is less debris entering the pipe that takes surface/downpipe water from the front of the pub to the side garden.

There is no water getting to the cellar due to works carried out at the back of the pub. The newly installed pumps and switch system will tackle any water that overcomes defences.

As of Tuesday 9 April, the Peterborough Arms Drainage Appeal stood at £10,881. Our thanks to all those generous people who have donated to date.

<u>Refurbishment</u>

Bedroom 1 refurbishment is still taking place, with the main window sill and frames now fully painted and the last secondary double glazing unit in this room installed.

The rest of the window panes (estimated 72) are being prepared and painted. The pub is now on fibre broadband and the telephone cable that was causing us some irritation in getting secondary double glazing fitted has been terminated on the outside wall.

Carpenters Workshop

Progress is frustratingly slow due to the attitude of the contractors.

Volunteers have had to carry out some work on the side wall panels due to lack of stability in the high winds.

Thanks to the accounts team and MCC volunteers, roofing battens, felt and nails are now on site along with the roof rafters.

The timber for creating the windows is on site and Bob Howlett and others will be using facilities offered at Calne Men's Shed to start creating the window frames this month.

We are in the final stages of an order for solar panels for the off side roof (no panels will be seen from the towpath) and are chatting to a local reclamation yard about reclaimed Welsh slate for the roof.

Work on the Dry Dock has resumed with the casting of five 11ft 6in coping sections to date. The steel caging has also been made up for five more, which we hope to cast in the next five work days. This will leave the four corner pillars to cast, plus the curved and angled wall sections.

Due to an ever increasing work load Jon Coates has yet to compare for any anomalies the two quotes we have received for the supply of timber. Both companies were given the same brief and cutting list, but one quote is £15k lower than the other, so we need to be sure that we are comparing like for like. Jon is aware this comparison must be complete by May 2024.

The Binnies study on river proposals (including Biodiversity Net Gain) has been further delayed. We are now hoping to get the first report by early April.

We had hoped to recommence flow surveys of the river in Melksham in early spring, but the very wet winter means that the earliest we can hope to be on the river is late April.

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The wood chip delivered by Catley's Ltd of Devizes was transferred from Green Lane Farm to Pewsham where it was used for a new mud-free path to the Carpenters Workshop. The meadows, Double Bridge and the towpath were mowed and will now be left to allow wildflowers to grow. It wasn't possible to use the cut and collect mower as the ground was too soggy.



It's been a good year for primroses along the canal. The coppicing work carried out in the hazel copse opposite Double Bridge has produced a flush of flowers (celandines) in the area.

- £82 to be charged to Melksham Link project, for rope and a textbook for river flow surveys.


Bank balance at the end of the month was £2,834.




Pewsham Locks Heritage Site: Project status at 27/03/2024

Here is an overview of the work the Wilts & Berks Canal Trust is doing at Pewsham to restore three locks and a historic industrial site which serviced the construction and maintenance needs of the canal in the 19th Century,

The buildings on the site

The Trust is currently working on the rebuilding of the Canal Workshop, aka the Carpenters' Worshop, and the Dry Dock. This work is being done by our volunteers and is using heritage and traditional materials wherever possible.

The Carpenters' workshop project is well advanced and awaits roofing in the course of the next month. In due course we want to offer the Carpenters' workshop as a learning centre where pupils at local schools can gain an understanding of working life on the canal in the 19th Century.

The Dry Dock, believed to be one of a very few examples in English heritage waterways, is awaiting completion of the coppicing to which the vertical members will be attached to support the tiled roof.

We have no detailed plans at present for the restoration of the Lock Kepper's cottage or the lime kiln, both of these will require the raising of new funds by the Trust.

The flight of 3 Locks

The four structures identified above are directly adjacent to a flight of three locks at Pewsham. These locks are located at the heart of the complex and are key to renewed navigation and future boating visitors on our canal. Their restoration to full operations is expected to require the work of specialist contractors and this will require new funding.

Meanwhile our volunteers are working on an accommodation bridge which will crosses the top lock and provide access to the Carpenter's Worshop from the main entrance.
