Branch News

Since my last report I have attended a number of meetings on behalf of the Branch. These have included:

- Melksham Link;
- Chippenham River Avon Project;
- Project meeting on the Carpenters Workshop;
- Trust Executive meetings; and
- meetings with Thuan Bui (Trust Branding).

At Pewsham I hosted Martin Hollis (Trust Chairman), Mike Gibben (Trust CEO) and Mr Malcolm Hewitt. This meeting was to show Malcolm our ongoing work at Pewsham and for Mike and Martin to explain our plans and aspirations going forward. I am pleased to say that, after this meeting, Malcolm agreed to set up and lead an advocate programme so that the Trust can start to reach out via his networking group to MPs, corporate heads etc. A title for Malcolm's group has yet to be determined.

Chippenham Avon Project

Those who live in Chippenham are hopefully actively addressing the issue of the new river plans, which at the moment will effectively see the water level drop to such an extent that boating will no longer be possible on the River Avon at the Town Bridge and upstream of it.

The Trust has officially responded to these plans expressing concern at the drop in water levels and challenging the Environment Agency with regards to the lack of studies to show a net gain in biodiversity if the current plans are adopted. Our comments will be shared when the Minutes of the May Branch meeting are sent out.

Fundraising

I made time to put a bid in to Calne Area Board seeking funds for materials to level the towpath at Green Lane Farm. The path is under restoration and currently walkable but, it is not flat or as level as it should be. If the bid is successful I hope we can use corporate work party volunteers to carry out this work in the Spring and Summer months.

We were very pleased to receive another donation of £1,000 from the Heddington & Stockley Steam Rally Committee for our Green work along the MCC line. Also £200 towards our work at Pewsham from an appreciative mum whose son used to enjoy walks along the Pewsham stretch.

Can I please remind members that there is **no vehicular access to Pewsham Locks** unless it is by prior arrangement. Our lease of the lane accessing the Pewsham site is for volunteers and contractors only.

Volunteers were delayed leaving site recently due to an unknown car parked in the Green Lane. Volunteers could have simply locked the gate and left the owner to sort it out but, even after a long day, they waited until the car owner arrived back at his car. We can't always guarantee to do this.

Engineering

Cases For Support (prerequisite paperwork before fundraising can commence) have been approved for:

- progressing an early contractor involvement (ECI) contract to investigate the
 feasibility of an alternative method of constructing the M4 crossing using
 jacking/tunnelling techniques; discussions continue with possible design and build
 contractors; and
- developing the business case for the hydro generator at Melksham Gate Weir; the
 next step is to appoint people to the key roles of project manager and consultants to
 undertake design and cost appraisals.

Planning

The developer for Wichelstowe has finally resolved planning conditions and can start on the phase 3 canal construction.

The possible loss of a route into Swindon town centre through the Oasis site will make the continuation of the canal from Wharf Green to the south side of the railway line much less valuable. A meeting with the developer of the Oasis and a councillor is scheduled.

Work Parties

Planning

We held a special planning meeting in April to begin to talk through possible priorities once our current three Major Projects are finished. Obviously, there's still a lot of work to do before they can be regarded as finished, but we need to stay ahead of the curve. You'll hear a lot more about future projects over the coming months, and I hope we will be able to get the views of the Branch as a whole through discussions at the Branch meetings.

April's meeting

Another positive meeting this month, with a lot of progress being noted. This included completing nearly all of our outstanding Actions, significantly reducing the number of Jobs remaining on our Jobs List (these are the smaller jobs that sit outside of our Major Projects, but which are just as important) and making good inroads into the maintenance of our small machines (our larger kit ... dumpers, excavators etc. ... is more challenging).

Andrew Fergusson reported on the results of the Branch H&S audit that he and Fiona Rivers recently carried out on behalf of the Trust. The feedback from the Trust was very positive; they are extremely happy with the way that all the volunteers have embraced our H&S policies and culture. One learning point came up in relation to working with contractors; we need to be more assertive when it comes to the practices of third parties working on our sites.

As ever, Howard Yardy's report on Green Team activity covered a whole range of activities. We discussed possible sitings of mink, managing Ash dieback; establishing reed pulling protocols and the progress of Howard's tree planting project.

Within Major Projects, we agreed to continue our investigations of the Studley Road Bridge, and to pursue a possible long term solution to the Hannah's Brook silt problem. We also agreed to create a 'scrape' near the River Avon to promote biodiversity, thus offsetting any adverse effects of the necessary removal of vegetation from the Naish Hill section of the canal.

Our next meeting will be in June, but you can be assured that before then, whenever two or more WPOs get together, they'll be discussing what to do, when and how!

Pewsham Locks

We continue to get a good number of volunteers at our work parties, which is great to see, so a big THANK YOU to everyone who gives their time to help.

Top Lock Bridge

This is one of our three Major Projects, and I'm please to say that the rebuild of the eastern wall of the lock chamber has now started, and steady progress has been made through the month.

The brick cutter is coming into its own and is making life so much easier for Roger Noyce and the team. We are most grateful to Jenny Lund for her generous donation towards its purchase.

Other Major Projects

Work continues on the Carpenters Workshop and the Dry Dock. More details in the reports from the Project Leads.

Other Work

As well as the work on our main three projects, the following has been achieved at Pewsham:

- Howard Yardy and team have been cutting up the large pile of logs just outside the main compound and putting them into storage for drying; these will create a useful source of income in 18 months or so when they are seasoned;
- the ditch to the East of Top Lock was cleared and a drainage trench dug, piped into Top Lock and then back filled; it is hoped that this will take some of the excessive amount of water that is draining through the ground and coming out to the side of the eastern wing wall;

- more bricks were cleaned ready for use;
- a causeway was created from the ramp in the Lower Pound to the Dry Dock; this will allow safer and drier access for volunteers and others to access the Dry Dock;
- a water harvesting system has been fitted to the roof of the Welfare Cabin; this includes a solar panel and water pump system;
- potholes in the Green Lane were filled;
- grass was cut within the Works Compound ensuring safe access for volunteers:
- paths were also created ready for the first 'Pewsham Day' of the season;
- Jeremy Brickell and Gary Tytherleigh carried out a Local Maintenance Plan Survey of the line from Top Lock to the Two Stiles. Issues raised are passed on to the WPOs for inclusion in their Jobs List and then for actioning.
- Henry Sullivan from Swindon Branch, with the help of Fiona Rivers and her van, took away much of the Swindon kit that we have been storing for them, now that they have their own storage facilities; this has emptied container #4, which is now being converted to include a work bench / work space area for Bob Howlett and Boat Team; and
- some extra roadstone was laid around the Slipway to make boat recovery easier.

Peterborough Arms

The flood Protection Fund stands at just under £12K. Planning drawings have been finalised for submission.

Carpenters Workshop

We continue to be frustrated by the lack of progress by the third party erecting the workshop, and concerned about the quality of the work. Jon Coates, Chief Engineer, will be discussing the materials that have yet to be delivered to site with a view to an early handover of the building to volunteers so that we can start to correct some issues and work on the roof and cladding.

Solar panels are ready for delivery, but we have delayed this slightly due to the lack of progress on the building, which has meant that we have yet to start the roofing.

Our local reclamation yard is unable to supply the quantity of Welsh roof slate that we need, so we will have to look further afield, or decide on using new slate instead.

Melksham Link

The Binnies study on river proposals (including Biodiversity Net Gain) has now been received, and we have had a meeting with them to discuss options. We are now considering these and hope to get a clear proposal to put to Wiltshire Council by the end of May.

Level surveys covering the A350 Challymead Bridge, and flow surveys of the river in Melksham are planned for mid to late May.

No further progress regarding the Hydro scheme.

There has been no further progress regarding the Masterplan and funding of the Project.

Wildlife



All our trees planted during the winter are showing signs of life.

The cherry trees have had a burst of blossom and now have green cherries on their branches.

The coppiced hazel trees are producing new shoots and have not been set upon by the deer.

We have a new offset verge mower for the Bee Route, which will make it easier to cut the towpath, canal bank and around the base of our trees quickly and safely.





At Double Bridge the tadpoles are progressing well but numbers are diminishing, probably due to the large number of fish.

The hedges laid by Fiona Rivers near the slipway have had blossom and will now bush up nicely to form a dense hedge.

The new hedge planted by the Carpenters Workshop is starting to grow, and with the section planted by Fiona in previous years will form a great green backdrop to the lock area.

On the bridge, the crop of dandelions has been replaced by buttercups, with lots more flowers to come.

Finances



Good income is starting to come through from Branch events:

- £506 from the Spring Quiz and raffle, after expenses; and
- £148 from the Pewsham Day's Pop-up Café, Boat Trips and Tours, boosted by donations:
- £121 from customers at Semington Dock;
- £100 member donation towards the cordless drill & driver set; and
- £23 at the branch meeting.

Expenses paid through the Branch bank account were low in April since most items (including the cordless set) went through the HQ account:

- £30 monthly rental at Showell Nursery;
- £17 nuts, bolts etc.:
- £40 welding work on a mower;
- £81 several cables and connectors for 12V battery charging; and
- £50 deposit on the pitch at the Chippenham Folk Festival.

After £1,500 was transferred to the HQ account there was £2,258 in the Branch account at the end of the month.
